COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed to enhance your first-year experience at Stony Brook University. Through academic advisement, learning about campus resources, group discussion, and collaborative teaching, you will be provided with a supportive and structured environment to assist you in making the transition to college. You will be encouraged to use critical thinking skills to set goals and make responsible decisions regarding academics, major and career planning, and social relationships. The course will explore the purpose of higher education and your role within the university environment.

- To develop and strengthen academic skills
- To discover and connect with Stony Brook University
- To explore the academic theme of your Undergraduate College
- To become civil and responsible members of our academic community

CLASSROOM EXPECTATIONS AND INFORMATION

- ***Class attendance:*** Because the learning process in this class will rely primarily on discussion, students are expected to attend all classes in order to receive course credit. More than two (2) absences will result in an Unsatisfactory grade (U). You must contact instructor regarding any potential issues with attendance, and/or to follow-up if needed.
- ***Class participation:*** The seminar requires the completion of all readings and assignments on the assigned day, together with thoughtful, engaged participation in class discussions.

The quality of your class participation will affect your final grade. Inadequate preparation for class, arriving late or leaving early, and/or missing class will be reflected in your class engagement grade.

- ***Class cancellation or delay:*** In the event of class cancellation, you will be contacted via Blackboard and/or email (your stonybrook.edu email account). Please check the main www.stonybrook.edu website regularly for any weather updates.
- ***Classroom Environment:*** Throughout the semester, sensitive issues may be discussed in class. As members of this seminar, all students are expected to read, discuss, and think critically about these topics and your responses to them. This does not mean that you are not expected to have emotional reactions to the material, but you should also be willing to engage those reactions - and your classmates - in respectful and thoughtful ways. As a class community we should always be mindful of people's experiences. If at any time you have concerns about the material or class discussions, please speak to the instructor, and/or contact your UGC advisor.
- ***Laptops, smartphones, tablets:*** Electronic devices should only be used during class for class purposes (e.g. taking notes, research, Blackboard, e-Textbook, etc). Facebook, email, texting, or other forms of social media that are not part of the seminar must wait until after class.
- ***Blackboard and Email:*** Students are required to check their Stony Brook email account and log into Blackboard regularly for important course information from their instructor and Undergraduate College Advisors.
- ***Instructor email and appointments:*** I am accessible via email and will try to respond as soon as I can. When sending emails, please include "FYS 101" in the subject line and include your full name within the body of the email. However, please do not wait until the last minute to email your concerns or questions. Typically any question that requires a more complicated response or thoughtful conversation should be asked in person (e.g. grading concerns; further explanation of assignments, etc). Students are encouraged to make an appointment to meet with me any time throughout the semester.
- ***UGC Fellow:*** Many 101 seminars have an Undergraduate College Fellow, an experienced student who will assist during class. Fellows are excellent resources and mentors and can help assist in the transition to Stony Brook. Our UGC Fellow is Mahzabin Alam mahzabin.alam@stonybrook.edu
- ***UGC Events and Programs:*** Getting involved and participating in campus life is an essential part of being a successful college student. COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- ***Seminar Engagement:*** Your engagement grade will reflect your attendance, preparation for class, and contributions to discussions. Students are expected to actively participate, contribute their own ideas and ask questions during this seminar-style class. In addition,

students are expected to attend all class sessions. **More than two (2) absences will result in an Unsatisfactory grade (U).**

- **Weekly Journaling (12):** Students will complete a brief written assignment prior to each class meeting. Responses should be 1-2 paragraphs and must be posted directly to Blackboard, under *Weekly Journals*. **Due on Thursdays at midnight.**
- **Co-curricular Event Reflections (4):** Students are expected to select and participate in various co-curricular UGC events throughout the fall semester and submit a written reflection paper for each of the UGC events attended. Students should select one event from each of the **Connect, Plan, and Expand** event categories within their UGC. Students will also attend the Fall Commons Day Event on October 17 when the First-Year Reading author visits campus. Reflection papers should be approximately 500 words. In order to earn credit for co-curricular participation, students must submit a reflection paper **within one week of the event date**. Specific event listings and details are posted on the UGC website.

 - Commons Day Event Reflection: All first-year students are required to attend a Commons Day event on Wednesday, October 17th (1-2:20 PM, Arena). *All FYS 101 classes during the week of October 15th will be canceled. You must submit a reflection paper about your experience, due the following week.*
- **ACH 101 Project Learning Outcomes/Objectives:** For our ACH 101 project, we will be exploring how ACH & STEM fields influence each other. You will be challenged to complete a group project which will be presented in class. Your project will focus on a specific area within STEM and demonstrate how ACH is represented as well. Each group will submit a creative project to show these connections. Class presentations will be a “live demo” explaining and showcasing your project. Each student will also be asked to submit an individual reflection paper, due the same day as your project. One group project per class will be selected to be the “Most Outstanding” & will be displayed in the Tabler Center Gallery.

EVALUATION AND GRADING

The First-Year Seminar (101) is a 1-credit course for which you will earn either a Satisfactory (S) or Unsatisfactory (U) grade. A Satisfactory grade corresponds to the letter grades: A-C; an Unsatisfactory grade corresponds to the letter grades: D-F.

The following grading scale applies for this course:

Attendance, participation, and the quality and thoughtfulness of assignments will be factored into the grading for this course.

- Engagement/Participation = 20%
- Weekly Journaling (10) = 15%
- Co-curricular Event Reflections (4) = 30%
- UGC 101 Project = 35%
